INTRODUCTION

Who We Are

Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) was founded 50 years ago to care for one of the world's largest Native Hawaiian populations. Due to the significant provider shortage in a medically complex under-resourced community, WCCHC implemented the Na Lei Kukui (Lei of Enlightenment) **Nurse Practitioner Residency Program with the goal** of developing a highly skilled and culturally informed workforce to serve the Islands of Hawaii.



Native Hawaiian Health Disparities

- Compared with non-Hispanic white populations in 2018:
- 2.5 times more likely to receive a diabetes diagnosis
- 2.5 times more likely to die from diabetes
- 4 times more likely to suffer a stroke
- 30% more likely to die from a stroke
- Nearly twice the infant mortality rate
